- Let your kids read in unusual places around your home. They can read in the garage, under the kitchen table, behind the couch, on the steps, in a tent, in the car, in the closet, or any other wacky place your (or they) can think of.
- Have a book sharing time. Your kids can tell you about the books they're reading. They can discuss what they like or don't like, what they think could be different, what is exciting or boring about the book, and more. Showing an interest in the books they are reading will make them want to read more.
- Let your kids read to the family pet. Fido and Kitty love to hear stories.
- Have a reading picnic. Bring books and lunch and relax in the sun.
- Have a Reading Olympics. Who can sit still in one place and read the longest? Who can read aloud the fastest? Those are just a few possible events for this exciting, summer sporting event.
- Let your kids act out parts of a story. This can make the story they are reading more exciting.
